

## Alan H. Rebar

Dr. Alan Rebar is NC State's fourth Vice Chancellor for Research. As Chief Research Officer (CRO), he oversees all research activities at NC State. Under his authority, units reporting to the Office for Research, Innovation, and Economic Development centrally manage research administration, the university's intellectual properties, and industry and government agency alliances on the university's award-winning research campus. Researchers at NC State are supported by \$349M in sponsored programs from federal, local government, industry, and nonprofit organizations. NC State's research portfolio exceeds 4,000 invention disclosures, 880 US patents, 600 active commercialization agreements, and 500 products to market. Centennial Campus hosts more than 70 corporate, government and non-profit partners working with the university's 75+ centers and institutes, laboratories and research departments.

An internationally renowned veterinarian, Dr. Rebar is an expert in comparative hematology, diagnostic cytology and toxicological pathology. He is a Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Pathologists, Editor-in-Chief of the *Journal of the American Animal Hospital Association*, former editor of *Veterinary Clinical Pathology*, past-president of the American Society for Veterinary Clinical Pathology, and a former member of the Council of the American College of Veterinary Pathologists. Previously, Dr. Rebar was the Senior Associate Vice President for Research at Purdue University and Executive Director of Discovery Park, where he also served as Purdue's Dean of Veterinary Medicine from 1996 to 2005, and as Associate Dean for Research in the college from 1989 to 1996, and a professor of clinical pathology.

Dr. Rebar has authored or co-authored 120 refereed publications and eight textbooks, and has made nearly 300 invited lectures at workshops and conferences in the United States and around the globe. He has served as a scientific advisor to numerous federal agencies and companies.

In recognition of his achievements, Dr. Rebar received the Award of Merit from the American Animal Hospital Association in 1989, and in 1994 he received the Gaines Cycle Fido Award for outstanding contribution to small animal medicine and surgery. He also received the 2001 Waltham Award given in recognition of outstanding activities or contributions by a veterinarian that have resulted in the improvement of the well-being of companion animals in the international veterinary community. In 2015, Dr. Rebar received the [Lifetime Achievement Award](#) from the American Society for Veterinary Clinical Pathology.

Dr. Rebar earned his doctorate in veterinary medicine in 1973 and his Ph.D. in veterinary pathology in 1975, both from Purdue.
